



NGCNA NetSetGO INFORMATION

This is general information pertaining to the NGCNA NetSetGO Program and the 3 Tiers.

NetSetGO Culture

The NetSetGO culture at NGCNA is for all clubs, coaches and umpires to work together to educate and support all players. This includes both their skill set and their behaviours.

Coaches shaking hands at the start of the session shows respect and provides an opportunity to have a quick chat about the session or game to ensure that everyone is on the same page.

Coaches have then set the example for players to shake hands at the end of the game showing respect to the opposition. The original '3 cheers' for the umpire, the opposition and your team delivers a positive message of good sportsmanship.

Respect the umpire. When the whistle blows, stop and look to the umpire for direction. Do not look to a parent on the sideline or another player on the court. This will confuse everyone.

General Information

NetSetGO is included in assisting with **Club Duty Days**. Duties include court set-up and pack down, goal ring adjustments between rounds and putting up safety pads to goal posts.

Be aware of draw interruptions, competition games, long weekend and school holiday period overlaps. Teams without a minimum of 5 players are to advise NGCNA no later than 6pm Friday as per the **Forfeit Process**.

Position Rotations

- U7 - U9 years rotate through all positions - Rounds 1-15.
- Maximum of a half game in the same position.
- Experience equal time across all positions.
- Rotate through attack / mid court / defence positions.
- U7 - U9 years rotation roster to be communicated to clubs.

Coaches

- U7 - U9 Normal checks of fingernails, no jewellery or hard brim hats, hair and shoelaces tied up.
- Shake hands with the opposing team at the end of the game.
- Positive encouragement / Team cheer.
- Coach and Umpire are to educate and coach players. Parents are not to coach the players.
- Be the example of good sportsmanship.
- In the event of an injury, the NGCNA Injury Report is to be completed.
- Coaches may give direction from the sideline.

Umpires

U7 - U8 Years

- Coaches may umpire their own games - half court to the right.
- Coaching of both teams to educate all players is allowed.
- Stick to the sideline unless addressing a repetitive breach.
- Umpires may walk on court to direct play.
- Before commencing the game, ensure spectators are back from the sideline and no spectators are standing behind the goal line.
- Normal checks of fingernails, NO hard hats, no jewellery / earrings. Taped earrings are not permitted.
- Introduce yourself to the opposition coach/umpire and discuss the level of the team or individual player.
- Umpires are to be on the same page so players do not receive mixed messages.

U9 Years

- Each club organises umpiring club games.
- Allocated umpires must be badged or supervised to be badged.
- Umpires must have completed the Rules of Netball Exam (70% pass).
- Coaching both teams to educate all players.
- Stick to the sideline unless addressing a repetitive breach.
- No walking on court directing play.
- Before commencing the game, ensure spectators are back from the sideline and no spectators are standing behind the goal line.
- Normal checks of fingernails, NO hard hats, no jewellery / earrings. Taped earrings are not permitted.
- Introduce yourself to the opposition coach/umpire and discuss the level of the team or individual player.
- Umpires are to be on the same page so players do not receive mixed messages.
